# Stay sober, get into service

If there was one message that came across loud and clear to alcoholics attending an Introduction to Service Seminar in March it's 'if you want to stay sober, get into service.'

Whether it be making coffee for your home group, or representing one of the largest AA areas in North America at the General Services Conference in New York, there is a service opportunity for everyone, members were told.

Duane T., a long time Calgary AA member who represented Area 78 (Alberta and the North West Territories) at the 2002 General Services Conference in New York, told the 75 AA members attending the seminar, he got into service within days of attending his first meeting.

"It was a long time ago," said Duane T. "But they said they needed someone to set up chairs for each meeting, they shoved a key in my hand and said 'you have a job.' It was a wonderful feeling because for a long time before I got to AA no one trusted me with anything. And here was an organization after my first couple meetings that trusted me with a key. And I have never looked back. There was always a lack of wholeness inside of me before I came to AA, but being involved in the program and being involved in service helped me discover a vital spiritual awakening which has filled that void."

The chairs and representatives of the various services committees for Calgary and area AA, in their presentations at the seminar, drove home a similar message that service work is an invaluable two-way street.

"Service work, in any capacity, means you are helping to carry the message of AA to those who still suffer," said Bruce G. chair of Calgary Intergroup. While Barry B. chair of the Calgary General Services Committee said "that giving back to others what was so freely given to us, is what keeps us sober. As we help others we get out of ourselves which is so important for an alcoholic."

Several speakers fondly talked about 'being railroaded' into their first service jobs. At the beginning they just wanted to sit on the sidelines, until someone coerced them into or just dumped a job in their laps. Others talked about being fearful of that first service work. They didn't know what they were doing. Didn't know if they were qualified.

All agreed taking on service was the best move they'd ever made to help maintain their sobriety. And while a job may seem daunting at first, they quickly found their way, and learned there was always ready support.

# The 7th Tradition keeps AA operating at all levels

I was in the program for about five or six months, when at a business meeting, I heard the words "shall we do a split". I had no idea that the money we contributed to the 7<sup>th</sup> tradition did anything more than pay for our coffee, cream and sugar. I didn't even imagine that we paid rent. I thought we were doing a great service to the community and rent was gratis.

It was explained to me that the split meant contributing to other areas of AA, such as our Intergroup which supports the operations of our Calgary Central office and ensures the that our phones are answered 24 hours a day. The voices of our monitors are often the first contact an alcoholic, who is still suffering, has with our fellowship. It also helps to support the Calgary General Service Committee, Area, and our General Service Office in New York. We at Northlanders, are able to do a split three or four times a year, as suggested in the pamphlet 'Self Support – Where Money and Spirituality Mix'.

In 1957 Bill W. wrote that "our spiritual way of life is safe for future generations if, as a Society, we resist the temptation to receive money from the outside world." He went on to say that our groups, our areas, and AA as a whole will not function unless our services are sufficient and our bills are paid. For this we are responsible. Our New York Headquarters is absolutely essential to our continued expansion, to our survival as a Fellowship, and those costs rests squarely upon all of us, as we do not accept outside contributions.

One of the things our New York Office does to carry the message is writing and publishing all our literature. Our Big Book is now in its' 4<sup>th</sup> revision and is translated to over 20 different languages – the English to Spanish translation cost \$25,000.

AA directories are printed each year to ensure anyone in the world can find a contact phone number and find a meeting anywhere in the world.

They ensure that the message is carried behind the walls of prisons, institutions, hospitals, remote communities, and to people in isolation.

All of this and to say nothing of the regular business operations, and spreading the message around the world.

There are dozens of service opportunities within AA in Calgary and area ranging from being involved in the AA organization itself at the area, district or group level; working with alcoholics directly through projects such as Bridging the Gap, treatment facilities, correction centres; working with the professional (medical) community, carrying the AA message to the general public, organizing special AA events, recording and preserving the history of AA in Calgary, and the list goes on.

"One of the most important service opportunities we as alcoholics can provide is telephoning monitoring," said Alex K. a former chair of the phone monitoring service. Telephone monitoring involves answering calls to Calgary Central Office after regular business hours. "Much of time you are just helping an AA member find the time and location of an AA meeting in the city or area, which is important. But often too you are the first contact a struggling alcoholic has with the AA program. By sharing your experience as well as further contact with someone on the 12<sup>th</sup> Step list you are introducing them to the miracle of this program that has helped so many. And that is a tremendous feeling."
