

In 1951, our cofounder Bill W. wrote that these services "enable us to function as a whole," they are "the most vital, yet least understood group of services that AA has." This month, our special section features inspiring stories by members involved in the wonderful world of general service.

In the story "I Can Handle This," a woman with eight years of sobriety drinks her husband's wine while on a vacation in France-an act that leads to years of controlled drinking and misery. In "Back From Hell," a man with 20 years decides he needs a "break" from AA. The break he gets is not what he had in mind. "She Said She Was Doing Fine" is a sad tale about a member who has a sober friend who knows everyone in AA and seems to have it all, yet drifts away and relapses. In the story "Why We Do It," a member sits grumbling in a Concepts workshop, yet soon hears the very words that will change his tune. 
## Brothers In Our Defects


We recovered alcoholics are not so much brothers in virtue as we are brothers in our defects, and in our common strivings to overcome them.

As Bill Sees It. P. 167


The identification that one alcoholic has with another is mysterious, spiritual – almost incomprehensible. But it is there. I "feel" it. Today I feel that I can help people and that they can help me.

It is a new and exciting feeling for me to care for someone; to care what they are feeling, hoping for, praying for; to know their sadness, joy, horror, sorrow, grief; to want to share those feelings so that someone can have relief. I never knew how to do this – or how to try. I never even cared. The Fellowship of A.A., and God, are teaching me how to care about others.









# **Step 5 & Tradition 5**

Step 5 - Admitted to God, to ourselves and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.

# From Alcoholics Anonymous, Chapter 6 Into Action p.72-73

Having made our personal inventory, what shall we do about it? We have been trying to get a new attitude, a new relationship with our Creator, and to discover the obstacles in our path. We have admitted certain defects, we have ascertained in a rough way what the trouble is; we have put our finger on the weack items in our personal inventory. Now these are about to be cast out. This requires action on our part, which, when completed, will mean that we have admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being, the exact nature of our defects. This brings us to the *Fifth Step* in the program of recovery mentioned in the preceding chapter.

This is perhaps difficult – especially discussing our defects with another person. We think we have done well enough in admitting these things to ourselves. There is doubt about that. In actual practice, we usually find a solitary self-appraisal insufficient. Many of us thought it necessary to go much further. We will be more reconciled to discussing ourselves with another human being when we see good reasons why we should do so. The best reason first: If we skip this vital step, we may not overcome drinking. Time after time newcomers have tried to keep to themselves certain facts about their lives. Trying to avoid this humbling experience, they turned to easier methods. Almost invariably, they got drunk. Having persevered with the rest of the program, they wondered why they fell. We think the reason is that they never completed their housecleaning. They took inventory all right, but hung on to some of the worst items in stock. They only thought they had lost their egoism and fear; they only thought they had humbled themselves. But they had not learned enough of humility, fearlessness and honesty...

Tradition 5 – Each group has but one primary purpose – to carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

# <u>From Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions,</u> p.150-151

"Shoemaker, stick to thy last! ", better do one thing supremely well than many badly. That is the central theme of this Tradition. Around it our Society gathers in unity. The very life of our Fellowship requires the preservation of this principle.

Alcoholics Anonymous can be likened to a group of physicians who might find a cure for cancer, and upon whose concerted work would depend the answer for sufferers of this disease. True, each physician in such a group might have his own specialty. Every doctor concerned would at times wish he could devote himself to his chosen field rather than work only with the group. But once these men had hit upon a cure, once it became apparent that only by their united effort could this be accomplished, then all of them would feel bound to devote themselves solely to the relief of cancer. In the radiance of such a miraculous discovery any doctor would set his other ambitions aside, at whatever personal cost.

Just as firmly bound by obligation are the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, who have demonstrated that they can help problem drinkers as others seldom can. The unique ability of each A.A. to identify himself with and bring recovery to, the newcomer in no way depends upon his learning, eloquence, or on any special individual skills. The only thing that matters is that he is an alcoholic who has found a key to sobriety...

There is another reason for this singleness of purpose. It is the great paradox of A.A. that we know we can seldom keep the precious gift of sobriety unless we give it away.
