The word "Pioneer" speaks to the history shared by each speaker who has witnessed the growth of our beautiful fellowship in Calgary. The evening includes an Al-Anon speaker followed by a panel of four speakers, each with decades of recovery experience, sharing their personal stories and insights. After the panel, a dinner speaker will also share their unique experiences of recovery in our area. The event features a beautiful catered meal and an opportunity for fellowship, bringing together recovery community members to celebrate their shared journey.

We look forward to hosting you for an inspiring evening of stories, connection, and celebration of recovery!



Delegate's Corner

Hello Area 78, harvest time! It's been a really good year for crops in our Area, for the most part. We had a lot of good rain and then a long fall season with lots of sun. Bumper crops, reaping what was sown in good measure! I look at myself and all those around me, noticing the harvest of not only my garden, but my heart's garden as well. My action garden, my spirit garden! During my evening inventory, was I kind, loving and tolerant? Have I been giving of all that has been freely given to me? Can I lay my head and rest with a clear conscience? What are the "fruits" of my daily actions! I hope you all are equally reflective this fall of your own harvest. And noticing our Area 78's harvest, I can say we are doing well as an Area! We had our elections for our Table Officers and Committee Chairs September 12-14 in Edmonton. The Assembly was very well attended, one of the highest attendance counts in recent years! Well done you!

The positions were all filled and none by acclamation as we had several really well qualified people to choose from for each and every position that was filled. Let's welcome and support our new Panel 76 Table officers: Delegate is Dave S and I am sure he will continue to foster leadership and unity in our Area. Our Alternate Delegate is Jeff B who did an awesome job as Area Chair. Our new Chair is Lynn C, recent Treasurer extraordinaire! The new Treasurer is Hugh M, and the new Secretary is Colette H. The Panel 76 Table Officers along with our 10 new Committee Chairs all love AA so much that they are willing to sacrifice some time and energy to ensure our Structure remains strong for those yet to come. Thank you all!

Speaking of remaining strong for those yet to come, our budget increased this year to cover additional costs and for the general liability insurance coverage for all groups. Area 78 is overseeing this and we voted to add a new budget line for this cost of \$6303 this year. At the Assembly I heard over and over again how some groups who had to pay upwards of \$400 - \$1,000/year, (and some that had to close because they couldn't afford Insurance), are now able to contribute more to Area 78 to carry the message of recovery farther. With this coverage, every group, and the service bodies within Area 78 are covered through the general liability Insurance at the \$5MM level. Special events can also be covered by emailing the Area insurance sub-committee well in advance of your event (insurance@area78.org). They will arrange and forward the Certificate of Insurance (COI) for your group facility and/or for a special event.

As members, we are the only ones to financially support our program that brought about so many incredible miracles. The Area needs the continued support of groups and members as they are able to financially contribute. What do we owe to the life we have now?

At the 75th Conference in New York, I heard Kevin P give our financial report. I found it interesting that group contributions make up 63% of our overall budget income! And that the biggest source is from group contributions of \$50-\$100 per year! (\$26,000!) The second largest source is from groups sending \$50 or less! (\$24,000). Another amazing fact: Individuals who sent in \$50 or less totaled

\$14,862, \$50-\$100 contributed \$9,218! Only 286 people sent in \$5000 this past year and none sent in the \$7,500 max. So it is not the huge contributions that make up our budget, but the slow steady stream of what we can afford actually sent in. We thrive in AA on those regular, smaller donations of the many who contribute to all the levels of service. So grateful!!

Our meeting guide app cost \$50,100 last year and is maintained at a high level for users. This is another way our membership's 7th Tradition \$\$ is at work in a good way! We broke even on the International Convention with 33,801 paying members attending! The next International is in St. Louis in 2030! Celebrating AA being 95 years old! We are 90 years old now. Together, by being of service we have maintained a program that actually saves the lives of millions of sufferers of the disease of Alcoholism worldwide. And it's just been you and me keeping this thing alive! That equals a lot of love! That is an incredible harvest that we all have a part in celebrating.

We still know the work is not yet done. Our message of hope is truly an ongoing, full-time year-round operation! We are like a greenhouse! We continue sowing seeds even when it's cold outside, keeping the heat and lights on all the time! This we do for the love of what giving brings to us, and the lives it saves.

In closing this month's 'Delegates Corner' bit of news to keep you all informed, awake and aware, I want to thank you all so much for stepping up and being responsible! For the self-discipline and personal growth that has come from taking an active role in loving Alcoholics Anonymous.

We are way better than me.



Tradition 10

No A.A. group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate AA, express any opinion on outside controversial issues - particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever.

Since it began Alcoholics Anonymous never has been divided by a major controversial issue. Our fellowship never has taken sides publicly on any question in this embattled world. This has been no earned virtue. It could almost be said that we were born with it, for as one old-timer recently declared, "Practically never have I heard a heated religious, political, or reform argument among AA members. So long as we don't argue these matters privately, it's a cinch we never shall argue them publicly."



Let us re-emphasize that this reluctance to fight one another or anybody else is not counted as some special virtue which makes us feel superior to other people. Nor does it mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back

away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see the right upon issues of our time. But when it comes to AA as a whole, that is a different matter. As AA's we do not enter into public controversy, because we know that our fellowship will perish if we do. We conceive the survival and spread of Alcoholics Anonymous to be something of greater importance than any weight we could collectively throw back of other causes. Recovery from alcoholism is life itself to us, and we wish to preserve in full strength our means of survival.

Considering how most of us have really loved controversy, this denial of the privilege of attacking something or somebody in public is no small achievement for the naturally aggressive people that we are. To make our survival as a fellowship sure, we have often gone far in the opposite direction. Years ago, for example, we stood in great fear of the misuse of the AA name by AA's and outside groups who wanted to use it for their own money-raising, controversial, or publicity purposes. And we reflected that the bigger AA grew, the greater this temptation would surely be. Therefore we felt we had to find a way legally to protect the precious name of our society. Our Trustees were advised that this could be done only by incorporating the name Alcoholics Anonymous in every state of the Union and in all foreign countries. We actually began this tedious, complicated, and expensive task, which finally bogged down in a mass of technicalities, red tape, and charter.

But the conscience of Alcoholics Anonymous, its General Service Conference, had other ideas. The Conference pointed out to us how foolish it would be to incorporate AA's way of life as a legal instrument with which to attack anyone, no matter what the provocation. We would not be content with such an instrument with which to attack anyone, no matter what the provocation. We would not be content with such an instrument for purposes of pure restraint. Under enough provocation, we would be bound to start public lawsuits and thus enter the field of public controversy. It would be like building a war machine on the theory that it would always stay home and never fight. It would mean the legal organization of a fellowship whose Traditions insisted on its being unorganized. The Conference thought we ought to forget about the questionable advantages of legality and controversy and rely on group and public opinion for our ultimate protection. After long debate, we at the Headquarters saw that the conscience of Alcoholics Anonymous, acting through the delegates, was wiser than we were. So the Congress of the United States was never asked to incorporate AA.

Step 10 & Tradition 10

Step 10 - "Continued to take_ personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it"

AS we work the first nine Steps, we prepare ourselves for the adventure of a new life. But when we approach Step Ten, we commence to put our A.A. way of living to practical use, day by day, in fair weather or foul. Then comes the acid test: can we stay sober, keep in emotional balance, and live to good purpose under all conditions?

A continuous look at our assets and liabilities, and a real desire to learn and grow by this means, are necessities for us. We alcoholics have learned this the hard way. More experienced people, of course, in all times and places have practiced unsparing self-survey and criticism. For the wise have always known that no one can make much of his life until self-searching becomes a regular habit, until he is able to admit and accept what he finds, and until he patiently and persistently tries to correct what is wrong.

When a drunk has a terrific hangover because he drank heavily yesterday, he cannot live well today. But there is another kind of hangover which we all experience whether we are drinking or not. That is the emotional hangover, the direct result of yesterday's and sometimes today's excesses of negative emotion-_anger, fear, jealousy, and the like. If we would live serenely today and tomorrow, we certainly need to eliminate these hangovers. This doesn't mean we need to wander morbidly around in the past. It requires an admission and correction of errors now. Our inventory enables us to settle with the past. When this is done, we are really able to leave it behind us. When our inventory is carefully taken, and we have made peace with ourselves, the conviction follows that tomorrow's challenges can be met as they come.

Although all inventories are alike in principle, the time factor does distinguish one from another. There's the spotcheck inventory, taken at any time of the day, whenever we find ourselves getting tangled up. There's the one we take at day's end, when we review the happenings of the hours just past_..._

Tradition 10 – _"Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public_ controversy.

NEVER since it began has Alcoholics Anonymous been divided by a major controversial issue. Nor has our Fellowship ever publicly taken sides on any question in an embattled world. This, however, has been no earned virtue. It could almost be said that we were born with it, for, as one old-timer recently declared "Practically never have I heard a heated religious, political, or reform argument among A.A. members. So long as we don't argue these matters privately, it's a cinch we never shall publicly.

As by some deep instinct, we A.A.'s have known from the very beginning that we must never, no matter what the provocation, publicly take sides in any fight, even a worthy one. All history affords us the spectacle of striving nations and groups finally torn asunder because they were designed for, or tempted into, controversy. Others fell apart because of sheer self-righteousness while trying to enforce upon the rest of mankind some millennium of their own specification. In our own times, we have seen millions die in political and economic wars often spurred by religious and racial difference. We live in the imminent possibility of a fresh holocaust to determine how men shall be governed, and how products of nature and toil shall be divided among them. That is the spiritual climate in which A.A. was born, and by God's grace has nevertheless flourished.

Let us reemphasize that this reluctance to fight one another or anybody else is not counted as some special virtue which makes us feel superior to other people. Nor does it mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see the right upon issues of our time. But when it comes to A.A., that's quite a different matter. In this respect, we do not enter public controversy, because we know that our Society will perish if it does. We conceive the survival and spread of Alcoholics Anonymous to be something of far greater importance than the weight we could collectively throw back of any other cause.
